









Grant Purpose



What determines health?

The U.S. spends more money per person on health than any other country, but our lives are shorter by nearly four years—than expected based on health expenditures.


Does not include countries with populations smaller than 500,000. Data are for 2003.

*Per capita health expenditures in 2003 U.S. dollars, purchasing power parity

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

CFP overview

Grants:

- At least 4 grants
- Up to \$100,000 each
- Grant period: January 2018 January 2020
- Main grant product/outcome: completed HIA


Eligible organizations:

- Nonprofits (including community-based organizations)
- State, local, tribal government agencies
- Educational institutions
- Should be based in one of 14 eligible states








Selection Criteria



Healthy Vinton/Vinton Saludable Health Impact Assessment Demonstration Project

William L. Hargrove, Director Patricia M. Juárez-Carrillo, Coordinator



- Small rural town incorporated as a "village" in the state of Texas; about 10 miles from the U.S./Mexico border
- Population of about 2000, 94% Hispanic, 21% living below the poverty line
- Water sources: domestic wells, private providers, about 20% on EPWU
- Sanitation: Septic tanks





- Connect Vinton to El Paso Water Utilities for both water and sanitation
- Cost: \$15 million for water; \$20 million for sewer
- Voted down twice by city council based on high cost

HIA - Healthy Vinton

Goal

Examine the current status of public health in Vinton and evaluate the potential impacts related to changes in water and sanitation infrastructure.





- Profile existing conditions
- Evaluate potential health impacts
- In our case:
- Water quality survey
- Household survey
- Key informants
- Focus groups

Stakeholder Engagement

- Advisory Committee
- Presentations at City Council
- Public meetings
- Interviews and focus groups
- Discussions through household survey

Most Significant Results

- Local wells contained high levels of arsenic and salt, and contamination by *E. coli* and/or other coliform bacteria; also risk of dropping water tables due to drought
- Septic systems average of 20 yrs old and failing
- Prevalence of gastrointestinal illnesses, neuropathy, skin problems, 2x higher than reference community
- Few fire hydrants; fire insurance very high
- Businesses unwilling to locate there even though located adjacent to I-10

Follow-Up by Vinton

- Vinton Council voted to pursue funding for the project
- Vinton used our results to make a case for public health hazard, and obtained funding from TX Water Development Board and Ioan from USDA-RDA



- Be prepared to address the challenges of rural areas
- Recognizing the importance of culture and language
- Building awareness, civic engagement, civic discourse
- Moving the "spotlight" from costs to benefits... health, community development, sustainability, resilience, etc.
- Student participation
