Dental Therapy Timeline

More than 63 million people in the United States live in areas with dentist shortages. Dental therapy is a proven solution that has helped increase access to care. Dental therapists are midlevel providers who deliver preventive and routine restorative treatment at schools, nursing homes, and veterans homes to people who would otherwise struggle to get access to care.

Alaska tribes greenlight dental therapist training.

Minnesota becomes the first state to pass dental therapy legislation.

First Minnesota dental therapy class to graduate begins work.

Maine passes dental therapy bill.

Commission on Dental Accreditation guidelines for dental therapy training programs approved.

2017

77 Minnesota dental therapists provide more than 100,000 visits.

Arizona passes dental therapy bill.

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2005: Dental therapists begin providing care in Alaska

Alaska Native communities with dental therapists had lower rates of tooth extractions and more preventive care than Alaska Native communities without access to such care.



Dental therapists are cost-efficient mobile members of the dental team and can travel to meet the demand in rural towns across the state.
