# **Health Impact Project**

A national initiative designed to promote the use of health impact assessments (HIAs) as a tool to support healthier decisions.

- Providing coordination and infrastructure to establish HIAs as a well-recognized field in the U.S.
- Completing federal-level HIAs
- Conducting research, training, and events to support the field
- Demonstrating the effectiveness of HIAs by funding a series of HIA demonstration projects



# Why Program Grants?

- Supporting ongoing practice—moving beyond HIA as a one-time, grant-funded activity—is next step
- Making consideration of health more routine through self-sustaining HIA programs is the goal
- Building strong and lasting partnerships and relationships with key stakeholder and decision makers is the result



# **HIA Program Models**

- Formalized inter-agency cooperation and funding agreements
- Regional HIA collaborative groups
- Legislation that mandates or supports HIA
- Using HIA to build new tools and approaches that integrate health

# Call for Proposals

- Up to four program grants
  - One of these is supported by The California Endowment, and will fund a California-based HIA program grant.
  - \*\*Pending funding approval\*\*: possible two additional HIA program grants in Cleveland/Cuyahoga County and Metro Denver Region.
- \$250,000 for each grant
- Projects must be completed in 24 months

#### **Outputs:**

- Two completed HIAs
- Systems, relationships, and funding mechanisms to implement a stable, self-supporting HIA program at the regional or state level.



# Am I Eligible to Apply?

#### Applicant organization must be...

- A state, tribal or local agency; or
- A tax-exempt educational institution; or
- Tax-exempt organizations (including public charities and private foundations).

### In addition, applicant organization must...

- Be located in the United States or its territories; and
- Have completed at least one HIA at the time of submitting a brief proposal.



## **Selection Criteria**

- HIA experience;
- Completion of one HIA;
- Quality of the applicant's prior HIA work;
- Strength of collaborative partnerships (particularly with agencies outside the health sector);
- Focus on vulnerable subgroups and health equity;
- A detailed, feasible and realistic plan for sustaining and funding HIA efforts at the conclusion of funding.



## Types of projects will or will not fund

#### **HIA Program**

Already established HIA programs will be less competitive.

#### HIAs

- HIA should focus on an active decision making process.
- HIAs on urban land use planning will be accepted for program grants.
- HIAs should focus on local, tribal, or state-level decisions, or, federal decisions that have local effects.



# 2-Stage Application Process

- 1. Brief proposal, due September 14, 2012: Reviewed by Health Impact Project staff. Invitations for full proposal sent October 1, 2011.
  - Description of two proposed HIAs and HIA program
  - Letters of support
  - Budget estimate
  - Can submit only one brief proposal for HIA program grants

#### 2. Full proposal, due December 14, 2012:

Notice of funding decisions will be sent February 2013.



# **Application Stage #2: Full Proposal**

### If invited, you will be asked to submit:

- A detailed project narrative, expanding on responses in the brief proposal related to the two HIAs and program grant.
- A detailed workplan with interim deliverables for each proposed HIA
- Three letters of support required
- Resumes for key staff (or required skill sets for future hires)
- A budget, budget narrative, supporting documents.
- Description of matching funds



# Notes on Matching Funds and In-Kind Contributions

- \$100,000 match or in-kind contribution required
- Funds from all sources except other Health Impact Project
- In-kind contributions from applicant or partner organizations

$$Grant = $250,000$$

+ Match/In-Kind Contribution = \$100,000\$350,000 total grant amount



# **Grantee Expectations**

- Participate in Peer Learning Community
- Attend regular meetings with Health Impact Project staff
- Share interim deliverables (such as a screening summary, draft recommendations, etc.)
- Follow Pew and RWJF communications guidelines for release of products and public dissemination
- Submit narrative and financial grant reporting
- Attend grantee and National HIA Meeting in D.C. (Sept. 2013)
