The Economic Value of Quiet Recreation on BLM Lands

The Bureau of Land Management oversees 246 million acres of public land across 11 western states and Alaska—from the northern boreal forest and rugged alpine peaks to colorful canyons and fragile desert ecosystems.



In 2014, there were more than **60 million visits** to these lands, nearly two-thirds of which were by people enjoying quiet (nonmotorized) recreation activities, like camping, hunting, hiking, and fishing.


in total direct spending on quiet recreation visits within 50 miles of recreation sites.
