

# The Cost of Delay: State Dental Policies Fail One in Five Children




INDIANA meets just three of eight policy benchmarks aimed at addressing children's dental health needs. It is the only Midwestern state to not reimburse medical staff for providing preventive dental care, and it is one of seven states with the most restrictive supervision laws for dental hygienists placing sealants in schools and other public health settings. Only a low percentage of its high-risk schools have sealant programs. The state also does not report data to the National Oral Health Surveillance System, making it difficult to identify the scope and size of its problems. More than 95 percent of the state's community water supplies are fluoridated, however, and 43 percent of Medicaid-enrolled children received dental services in 2007, the latest year for which data are available—just

above the national average.

### **HOW BAD IS THE PROBLEM?**

TOO MANY CHILDREN LACK ACCESS TO DENTAL CARE, WITH SEVERE OUTCOMES. One measure of the problem: more than half of the children on Medicaid received no dental service in 2007.
