


The Cost of Delay: State Dental Policies Fail One in Five Children **New Jersey**



NEW JERSEY meets just one of eight policy benchmarks aimed at addressing children's dental health needs, making it the worst performer of all states. New Jersey actually has the highest Medicaid reimbursement rate—exceeding dentists' median fees—in the country, far exceeding the national average. Still, less than one in three dentists in New Jersey treats Medicaid-enrolled children, and the state does not reimburse medical professionals who offer basic preventive services to Medicaid-enrolled kids.¹ New Jersey stands out in the region for its lack of use of fluoride and sealants. It is the least fluoridated state in the Northeast: Less than 25 percent of residents on community systems have fluoridated water, and the state does not have sealant programs in any of its high-risk schools.

HOW BAD IS THE PROBLEM?

TOO MANY CHILDREN LACK ACCESS TO DENTAL CARE, WITH SEVERE OUTCOMES. One measure of the problem: more than half of the children on Medicaid received no dental service in 2007.
