

The Cost of Delay: State Dental Policies Fail One in Five Children




WYOMING meets just two of eight policy benchmarks aimed at addressing children's dental health needs. Like their neighbors in other Mountain West states, Wyoming residents often travel long distances over difficult terrain to get to their doctors and dentists. But unlike some other neighboring states, including Montana, Wyoming is one of just seven states that require a dentist to supervise as hygienists apply sealants to children's teeth. The state also lacks a school-based sealant program for its high-risk schools. And although Wyoming reimburses physicians for providing basic, preventive dental health services, most kids are not receiving regular fluoride in their drinking water; the state provides fluoridated water to just 36.4 percent of its population on community water supplies. Wyoming does

not report data to the National Oral Health Surveillance System. The state's percentage of Medicaid-enrolled children receiving dental services in 2007, the latest year for which data are available, fell just shy of the national average.

HOW BAD IS THE PROBLEM?

TOO MANY CHILDREN LACK ACCESS TO DENTAL CARE, WITH SEVERE OUTCOMES. One measure of the problem: more than half of the children on Medicaid received no dental service in 2007.
