## Vulnerable Population Data and Definition Continued

- Vulnerable population include the neglected young, elderly, homeless, physically and/or mentally disabled/ill, low income status, non-native English speakers but is not all inclusive.
- Census reports and is logically reasonable that the vulnerable population is higher than that compared to the rest of Seattle due to the demographic data around the existing Station and Pioneer Square and Chinatown/I.D.
- To extrapolate disability data from the US HHS, 18-19% of population report consistent disability so it is likely even higher in the impacted area due to the increased vulnerable population (and higher population of disability mental and/or physical coexist with the homeless population).
