RE: Reporting progress on achieving MSY exploitation rates

Brussels, 17<sup>th</sup> December 2015

Dear Mr. Aguiar Machado,

Following this week's Fisheries Council, we would like to suggest improvements to the Commission's communication of progress towards setting fishing limits in line with Common Fisheries Policy (CFP).

We agree that is essential to convey which stocks are already fished at levels in line with CFP Article 2.2<sup>1</sup>. However, we have several concerns:

- **Definition of MSY:** Maximum Sustainable Yield can refer to biomass ( $B_{MSY}$ ), exploitation rates ( $F_{MSY}$ ) or catch levels ( $Y_{MSY}$ ). To avoid misunderstanding, at all times the Commission should clearly state which of the MSY objectives related to article 2.2 it is referring to. For instance, the Commission's publication on "fisheries in line with MSY"<sup>2</sup> lacks such clarity. Also, the Commission's communication on fishing opportunities for 2016 makes numerous references to MSY without specifying to which it refers<sup>3</sup>.
- **CFP Article 2.2:** In January 2015 the Commission highlighted Irish Sole as one of the fisheries "in line with MSY". This was despite that fact that ministers agreed to a Total Allowable Catch (TAC) of 90 tonnes, while scientific advice from the International Council of the Exploitation of the Sea (ICES) was no directed fishery in 2015. We urge the Commission to consider in its analysis the extent to which TACs are in line with Art. 2.2, including the precautionary approach.

- Reference point  $F_{MSY}$ : The Communication on Fishing Opportunities for 2016<sup>4</sup> stated that the Commission intends to continue to refer to  $F_{MSY}$  point values until new multiannual plans are agreed and in force. Independent of the outcome of the negotiations of multiannual plans and any introduction of ranges, we urge the Commission to maintain  $F_{MSY}$  point values as reference points for assessing progress towards setting fishing limits in line with the CFP.
- Illustrate progress and regression: The CFP stipulates that MSY exploitation rates have to be achieved on a progressive and incremental basis. In contradiction to this, Council agreed in October to move away from  $F_{MSY}$  exploitation rates for certain stocks in the Baltic. We urge the Commission to communicate both progress and regress in order to accurately evaluate the setting of sustainable fishing limits.
- Annual flagship report on the state of EU fisheries: In recent years there has been increasing public interest in fisheries which in part contributed to the agreement of ambitious objectives in the reformed CFP. We encourage the Commission to respond to this public interest with an annual, "State of EU Fisheries Report", which would bring existing information together in one place in an easily understood format, such as exploitation levels, biomass levels, CFP fact & figures, and a report on economics.
