- This survey was conducted of N=1,213 adults ages 18+ nationwide. N=1,103 interviews were conducted online and N=110 interviews were conducted via telephone. The interviews were conducted in English and Spanish, based on respondent preferred selected language.
- The survey was conducted using NORC at the University of Chicago's AmeriSpeak panel. AmeriSpeak is a nationally representative, probability-based panel of the U.S. household population. Randomly selected U.S. households are sampled with a known, nonzero probability of selection from the NORC National Frame and address-based sample, and then contacted by U.S. mail and telephone. More details about the NORC AmeriSpeak panel methodology are available <u>here</u>.
- Sample A was asked among N=608 respondents.
- Sample B was asked among N=605 respondents.
- An asterisk (\*) in a response category means that less than 0.5% of respondents chose that response category and a dash (-) represents no response.
- "Asked" is the percentage of respondents from each survey population that are asked a question because they meet a criteria based on a response to a previous question, meaning not all respondents received that question.
- *"All" is the percentage of the total sample.*
- The following demographics were provided by NORC for each respondent from their panel profile: age, gender, and ethnicity.
