

Rapid Health Impact Assessment RECOMMENDATIONS

Lessons from the Atlanta Beltline:

- 1. ADOPT neighborhood based Area Media Income formula for Inclusionary Zoning policy
- 2. Work with residents to DESIGN a legally binding Community Benefits Agreement
- 3. FUND coordination of overlapping partners to form a working group steering committee through the REACH grant and/or Coastal GA Indicators Coalition

SOCIAL CAPITAL, SOCIAL COHESION, HOUSING & JOBS

- 4. **EXAMINE** past plans, projects, and initiatives from **crosscutting** areas of concern
- 5. **COORDINATE** THE USE of **funds & subsidies** from urban redevelopment zones, enterprise zones, opportunity zones, community block group grants, & RE/CAP designation
- 6. **DISSEMINATE** results from Healthy Savannah survey to provide additional **data/information**
- 7. **EXPLORE** wealth generating anti-displacement **models** land trusts, cooperatives, credit unions

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY & CONNECTIVITY

- 8. **COLLABORATE** with residents and other stakeholders to identify potential locations for **trailheads/access points** that are based on pedestrian safety and walkability
- 9. **INSTALL** vegetation and sound **barriers** as the trail crosses through the Carver Heights/Villages neighborhood to shield residents from highway and arterial roadway noise

FLOODING & SEA LEVEL RISE

- 10. **MITIGATE** the potential for **displacement** associated with competition for land occupied by residents with proactive planning
- 11. Use **the GIS Wetness Index** to conduct further analysis and track areas vulnerable to flooding
